In 2021 I wrote in CILIP's information professional that I often worry I've brought a child along to the end of the world. Course the global south is bearing the brunt and has been for a while, the people least responsible suffering the worst consequences for it. Is it overly dramatic to call climate change an existential threat. Attenborough and climate scientists don't think so.


Jialing river running dry in August last year in Chongqing. Happened to the Yangtze too. This was their hottest period ever, until this week...

There are many many other images I could share of different parts of the earth literally looking like Christian hell, but you get the idea.

We're all about the evidence here, and the evidence irrefutably proves that mankind's destabilized the climate: all those images were previously one-in-a lifetime, generational events, now they're regular occurences.

We used to call these things "acts of God". Human activity warms the atmosphere, water's kept in the air more, hurricane seasons are longer and more devastating, extremes of weather are more frequent and severe.

Sustainability is inextricably linked to climate change/the climate crisis... and is about mitigating the risk of it, adapting to it and changing how we live and work to avoid the worst of its effects

But you may rightly ask "I'm a librarian, how are we going to cat' & class' our way out of this one?"

I don't have an answer! We've all got spheres of influence though, and we've geared our working lives within this one sphere of library work, but we can direct our efforts in certain ways and focus on certain things. Pulling together we can increase the spheres of influence until they're all-encompassing. We can work from the bottom-up and pull for change from the top-down. Hopefully, I can share some things that are happening and you can share what else you've been doing and spread your ideas...

Even if you don't consider the degradation of the natural world an existential threat, if you're cynical/"realistic" – heck, even a climate denier that's "done your own research" - this is still important, as "Sustainability" is also a buzz word now, a concept with different meanings to everyone as we've just heard, but one that opens up possibilities and opportunities. Library's have a central offer that people know but beyond that we can expand into new areas.



What does it mean for the NHS, and what are we doing about it?




Well first of all...

We're kind of part of the problem.

NHS causes up to 5% of the nation's carbon footprint (see Knowledge for Healthcare), we've the emissions of a small country and more than Gatwick airport annually, and 1 in 20 road miles is estimated to be NHS-related (see e-lfh environmentally sustainable healthcare module).

So we're partly causing some of the problems that we're treating our patients for...



Huge population health issues.





October 2020 NHS published "Delivering a Net Zero National Health Service" outlining plans to make the NHS the first net carbon zero health service (in midst of COVID, no less):






Some Trusts have even declared a climate emergency, like GOSH:



What it says:

Sustainability is one of KfH's" Guiding Principles" (see Appendix 5), though there is little in the way of concrete guidance/advice even within this strategy document, besides the "practical examples" listed on p63, "Sustainability: towards low-carbon knowledge services".

The practical examples here do demonstrate though how we are already doing this stuff, and we can lead by example...



Despite this, sustainability and net zero isn't mentioned in QIOF, so there's a disconnect... I'm aiming to change that (sorry everyone, lols).

Though we have guidance like this, it seems to me like developments in our field are coming from the ground-up, mainly.




https://www.cilip.org.uk/page/GreenLibrariesManifesto Healthcare libraries clearly weren't the focus of the Green Libraries partnership and its manifesto, so we're underrepresented (though you can help address this by signing-up).

Some of us from the CoP attended the first ever green libraries conference in March, and Blerina Hashani from the Green Libraries Partnership (and BL) was a guest speaker at our CoP's last meeting, so we're working in partnership now (as per point 5)...

Lots of the conference content sadly inapplicable to us as NHS libraries: while most of the attendees don't work for organisations that have pledged to go carbon neutral, they have a little more freedom in terms of estates etc. than we do.

Again, it seems like the best work's coming from the ground-up...

One very useful thing from Colin Jackson of Hampshire County Council Property Services' presentation: "The greenest library building is the one you've already built", better to work with that. To work out energy efficiency - divide energy bills by the floor area (measuring your energy per square metre). That figures a good start to work from.

Working with our Trusts' sustainability teams and our QI teams (introducing SusQI from the Centre for Sustainable Healthcare)


